Lids Against Polio

Infantile paralysis, more often called poliomyelitis or polio for short, is a highly contagious disease that predominantly (but not exclusively) affects young children. The virus causes signs of paralysis and disability. The disease can also have long-term effects and/or lead to death. Polio is incurable – but with a vaccination, life-long protection against polio can be achieved.

Collect lids and contribute to the fight against polio

Plastic caps or lids are made out of high-density polyethylene (HDPE) or polypropylene (PP) – highly valuable, recyclable materials. We collect plastic bottle lids in order to help finance the global vaccination program against infantile paralysis with the proceeds.

- **Which lids should be collected?**
Please only collect plastic lids and caps from drink bottles and cartons (e.g. soft drink bottles and juice and milk cartons).
- **Can I return deposit bottles (Pfandflaschen) without lids?**
Yes, of course. Regardless of whether these are “one-way” or “multiple-way” bottles, the important thing is the bottle itself with its deposit label.
- **Where can I hand in the lids?**
Please bring your plastics lids to a collection point. The location of all current collection points can be found on our homepage.
- **Why are 500 lids enough for a vaccination?**
A single lid weighs around 2 grams. 500 lids add up to approximately 1kg of plastic. The proceeds of 1kg cover the costs of a vaccination against polio.
